

A College Is Born

Thomas, Ross, and Stanfill, Jackson Architects, conceived this plan for the campus of JSCC.





September 27, 1967, was a momentous day for Jackson State registration.

The story of Jackson State began in 1957 when the Pierce-Albright Report, the results of a study ordered by the state legislature, was made to the Tennessee Legislative Council.

In 1963, the State Department of Education developed plans for establishment of a group of community colleges for the entire state. Acting on the recommendations of Governor Clement and the Tennessee Board of Education, the 1965 Tennessee General Assembly authorized the establishment of three community colleges, one to be located in each of the State's three grand divisions.

The announcement from Nashville in the summer of 1965 that Jackson had been selected for the site of the first community college in West Tennessee came as an acceptable surprise to the residents of Jackson, Madison County, and the surrounding area. Although colleges were not new to Jackson, the community college concept of higher education was different. It was indeed a bold new approach in the field of higher education.

The Story of JSC Begins

Soon after the announcement of the new junior college's location, a group of state officials and local civic leaders visited proposed sites, and finally selected the Paul Carter and F. H. Dyers' farms on Highway 70 East for the college site. Approximately 110 acres were purchased for \$103,500.

The local architectural firm of Thomas, Ross, and Stanfill designed the plans for the college, and the J. A. Jones Construction Company of Charlotte, North Carolina, was awarded the construction contract in July, 1966. The cost price was \$2,008,018.

On February 17, 1967, Dr. F. E. Wright was named the first President of Jackson State. He assumed the duties of his office on March 15, and Jackson State Community College was on its way.

School Survives Early Trials


Finally, after weeks of trying to learn the "ropes" about a new concept in education, of processing tons of paperwork, of recruiting the first freshman class, and of administering numerous tests to prospective students, the faculty and staff moved from a five room house to the still unfinished college in early September.

On September 27, 1967, Jackson State opened its doors for the first day of registration. A student body of 350 to 400 had been expected, but when the results had been tallied, 655 persons were students of Jackson State Community College.


Formal Dedication of School Is Held

On October 23, 1967, Jackson State Community College officially became part of the Tennessee educational system when the formal dedication ceremonies were held. A large crowd that included many local and state dignitaries attended the ceremonies, which were held in the just-finished gymnasium.

State Commissioner of Education, J. Howard Warf, was the principal speaker for the big event. He pointed out the many educational advances made in the state over the past few years, and recommended as a motto for the school, the one used by the State Board itself, "To strive, to seek, and most of all, to serve."

After the formalities, guided tours of the campus were conducted by students and the guests were treated to the first meal ever served in the cafeteria.





He graduated from Baylor University in 1942, and received his M. A. from Peabody College in 1948. In 1954, he was awarded an Ed. D. by Peabody.

He has served as Dean of Men at Baylor University, Academic Dean at Union University, and just prior to his present post, was President of Union University.

Also he was a chaplain in the Army Air Corps during World War II, being discharged with the rank of Major. He also belongs to many civic, church, and educational groups.

Certainly Jackson State is privileged to have a man of such experience and character as Dr. Wright for its first President.













JSCC Chorus




Mr. Donnie Adams directed the chorus with skill, and kept interest high.

(Below) David Sikes fights for a rebound against Martin. (Right) Milton Armstrong scores against the UTM Frosh.






When a team finishes 1-13, its season can rarely be called a success. Yet, in many ways, the Jackson State Generals, playing in their first season had many things to be very proud of. Playing without the benefit of college ball experience, and without scholarships to compensate their services to the school, the team functioned relatively well. Certainly, there will be better seasons to come.

The first basketball game in the history of Jackson State was played at home on January 23 against the Cumberland College Bulldogs. After a close start, Cumberland built up a sizable lead, and was never threatened. They led 43-27 at half-time, and the final score was Cumberland 92, Jackson State 57. Freddie Swift led the Generals in scoring with 17. Robert Johnson had 14, and Gary Gibbs added 13.

On November 30, the Generals were defeated 87-42 in a road game with Martin College. Numerous floor mistakes by JSC in the first half, plus hot shooting by the hosts gave Martin a 36-12 halftime lead. The second half was a different story as the Generals played some of the best ball they displayed all season, as they were almost even with the Indians during the final half. Milton Armstrong came off the bench to lead Jackson State with 10 points.

The first game of the new year found the Generals losing to Martin College again, this time by an 84-40 count. Martin put on a tenacious defense, allowing Jackson State only 17 points in the second half, after leading at the half 44-23. Milton Armstrong was the Generals leading scorer with 11 points.

One bright spot of the game was a newly found school spirit and greater game attendance. With a boost in morale, Jackson State seemed destined to bring in its first victory soon.

However, it was not to be in the next game, as the UT Martin Freshmen downed Jackson State 70-53. The game was nip and tuck during most of the first half, and the Generals seemed as if they might be upset minded. The Vols took a short lead late in the half, however, and pushed it to 42-35 at intermission. The Baby Vols came back in the second half to bomb the Generals 48-28, and carry away the victory.


Gary Gibbs led the Generals in scoring with 16, while Swift chipped in 15 and Armstrong 10.

It was a long time coming, but the Jackson State Generals won the first game in the school's history on January 21, 1968, as they defeated Albertson-Droughton College 94-69.

The Generals were high spirited as they moved on good shooting and quickness to build up a comfortable 49-21 halftime lead.

Gary Gibbs set a season high by scoring 26 points. Jerry Brown caught fire and contributed 24, while Swift and Armstrong had 16 and 15 to round out the scoring.

The game was a 100% team effort, and showed everyone just what kind of a team Jackson State could be.

The next game brought a loss, and a gain for the Generals. The loss was a heartbreaking 80-77 decision to Columbia State in overtime. The gain was in that Jackson State found its school spirit, and the team that will probably become our number one rival in years to come in Columbia State. The team gave its best effort of the season, and would have won victory number two, had it not been for many questionable fouls that they received. Jerry Brown was the Generals' leading scorer with 21 points.

Although things looked bright for the remainder of the season, the Generals could not find the right combination for victory again during the remainder of the season. The week after the Columbia St. game, they dropped two games, an 82-59 defeat at the hands of the UTM Freshmen, and a 96-54 loss to Comborland.

Cumberland.

The Generals came close on February 10, when they were edged in the final minutes by Freed-Hardeman 62-51. Powerful Paducah rolled over the

Generals again 116-49 on February 12.

The final game of the year was against Cleveland State, and once again victory was denied by only a hairbreadth, as the visiting Raiders held off a last minute charge to win 92-91. Special mention should be made of the effort of Gary Gibbs in this game, as the big center scored 30 points for a new JSCC single game effort.

At the end of the season, Mr. Jim Swope, presently coach of the UTM Frosh, was named head coach for next year, and Coach Marsh Goodson was elevated to the position of Physical Education Department Head. The 1968-69 season is full of promise for the Generals, as the return of this years' regulars, plus an area recruiting program that is expected to tap the West Tennessee area for some of the best high school players around, should mean many victories for the Generals in years to come.


